

Tdap

Tdap stands for Tetanus, Diphtheria, and Pertussis. Tdap is a vaccine that keeps you from getting all 3 of these serious infections. Here is what you need to know.



Ask your doctor if you need a Tdap shot.

What does the Tdap shot protect against?

- **Tetanus** causes pain in the muscles and can lead to locking of the jaw and death. It enters your body through cuts, scratches or wounds.
- **Diphtheria** causes a thick covering in the back of your throat. It can lead to breathing problems and death.
- **Pertussis** causes a lot of coughing called “whooping cough”. It can lead to being admitted to the hospital. It is also a serious infection for babies less than six months old.

The tetanus shot wears off after 10 years. You may get a Tdap shot 2 years after your last tetanus shot.

Who should get the Tdap shot?

- If you never received a single dose of Tdap.
- If you are around babies less than 12 months old.
- If you are a new mother and have not had the Tdap shot in the last 2 years.
- If you are a health care worker with direct patient contact.

Ask your doctor if you need a Tdap shot.

Tell your doctor if you have any allergies or if you have had a problem with a shot.

Tell your doctor if you had an allergic reaction after receiving a tetanus shot.
